These Are the Days After Easter

As the calend Lake County season. The fruitful, and season the season.

As the calendar turns to May, fields, gardens, orchards, and grasses are green and growing here in Lake County [Finally!]. Green is a welcome color of spring, reminding us of the new growth of the season. The green of spring also reminds us of God's promise to bless the earth, cause it to be fruitful, and supply the needs of all His creatures. Seeds are planted in fertile soil, and sun and rain cause the seed to sprout and grow. We now see evidence of the old saying of spring, "April show-

ers bring May flowers". By the way, do you know what Mayflowers bring? Pilgrims [©] Never mind, it's a dad joke.

Now that we are beyond Easter, there are 2 special days coming up on the Church calendar: Ascension and Pentecost. On Ascension, 40 days after Easter [May 9 this year], we mark the return of Jesus to the right hand of the Father, not to get away from the world, but to serve as our advocate to the Father. How encouraging to know the Savior of the world is pleading for you at the Father's throne. Good Friday showed us the price Jesus was willing to pay for the salvation of the world. Easter is the proof that the sacrifice is perfect and complete. Ascension is proof that, just as the He came from heaven to be our Savior, so He returned to heaven to rule all things for the sake of His Church—that is for the sake of us—His people.

Pentecost, 50 days after Easter [May 19 this year], reminds us of the promised pouring out of the Holy Spirit on the first apostles. The Spirit empowered them to be renewed servants of Jesus who became bold, effective witnesses of the Gospel of salvation through faith in Jesus Christ. Pentecost also reminds us of the new birth of faith in us through the marvelous, mysterious working of the Holy Spirit. For most of us, his work began with our Baptism. That new life of Baptism continues as the Holy Spirit works through the Word and Sacraments to strengthen and equip the people of God to effectively manage all God has given us. As God's stewards we have the promise that the Holy Spirit gives us the power to do what we cannot do ourselves

One important principle is God's people are served and serving. That means that we recognize that our Christian life involves a lifestyle powered by the Gospel that shows itself in servanthood in all areas of life. It is only by God's grace that we can serve Him and honor him with our time, talents, and treasures. So often we focus on our treasures, but money is only one part. The Christian life involves our wise management and use of all of life and its' resources for God's purposes

What a blessing and encouragement it is to know and believe Christ died for you, rose for you, ascended and the conqueror of our enemies, and now sends the Holy Spirit to strengthen and encourage us each day. May

Christian Hope Amidst Numerical Decline

At the rebuilding of the temple following the Babylonian captivity, Scripture records that many of the older generation wept aloud (Ezra 3:12). They had seen the first temple and remembered its former glory, now lost forever.

Such is the case for many within The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod today. The older saints among us reminisce about a time when there was standing room only on Easter morning. They remember confirmation classes of 30 or more. They speak with fondness tinged with sorrow of how the parish used to hum with activity throughout the week. But no longer. Today, the church building is in disrepair, the old-timers have gone on to heaven, and the younger folks have moved away. Those who remain feel the sense of loss acutely even as they worry about the future of their beloved church.

If any of this strikes a chord within your heart, I would like to offer some words of Christian comfort. In the first place, remember that the church does not, in fact, belong to us. We are members of the body, yes. But our Head is Christ. He is the church's Builder and Maker. You may have labored long in the fields of the Lord, but never forget that they are His fields. He will ensure the harvest. One man plants, another waters, but God alone brings the increase, where and when He pleases. Remember, it's not your business to make the church grow, however much you wish to see your local parish thrive. Instead, your task is to remain faithful to Christ and His Word.

Jesus has promised to build His church, and so He does. The church cannot fail! But this promise does not mean that Grace Lutheran Church in Plainsville, Iowa, will continue forever. Nor, for that matter, will The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Congregations have a natural lifespan. Buildings eventually crumble into

dust. Institutions drift away from their purpose. Where is the First Church of Jerusalem, founded by Christ through the Apostles on the Day of Pentecost? That congregation no longer exists. And yet, the one Church of Christ continues today, stronger and greater than ever before.

Consider this: You are part of the Church Militant. And what is your job? To be faithful unto death, until you are transferred to the Church Triumphant. For all the hand wringing about numerical decline within our Synod, the Church Triumphant only ever grows! Every time we hold a funeral, the church grows. Even should your little parish bury its last living member and then close its doors forever, the church of God grows!

On December 18, 2022, we held our final service at First Lutheran Church in Greenwich, Conn. For 80 years, the saints had gathered there to hear the words of Christ and receive the Sacraments. For the past 10, First Lutheran had been part of a dual parish; but now the two parishes were about to become one. We stripped the altar, as on Maundy Thursday, removing every sacred object and utensil from the chancel. Then, following the processional cross, the entire congregation, including the sole surviving charter member, processed out, singing, "Built on the Rock the Church shall stand, even when steeples are falling..." We locked the doors with the final stanza. It was profoundly moving. Many were openly weeping — even some who had only been worshiping there for a few years.

Was this closing of our doors a failure? By no means. For 80 years Christ stood among the people of First Lutheran as they gathered around His Words. Hundreds who came through those doors have now been transferred from this vale of tears to join the Church Triumphant. This is no failure. This is mission accomplished! And now the mission of God continues in another place and another time until the last of the saints has been safely ushered home.

Many of our congregations have difficult choices to make in the years ahead. Some will be given a way forward, as was the case in Greenwich, where two struggling congregations merged to form a single, stable parish. Others will have no choice but to close their doors. But this is not cause for panic. It is not reason, as we have sometimes done, to discard our hymnody and liturgy or to employ desperate and cringeworthy gimmicks. Yes, it is understandable to grieve at the closing of a parish; but remember that every church building on earth, however beloved it may be, is a temporary haven. Our true home is in heaven, and our true membership is with the Church Triumphant.

But as long as we remain on earth, take comfort in this: Where two or three are gathered in His name, there Christ stands among us, as He has promised. Where the Word of God is preached in truth and purity and where the Sacraments are rightly administered, there is the true church on earth. And no matter how feeble or small she may appear to mortal eyes, the church that our Lord has built stands glorious and terrible throughout the ages.

April Meeting Notes

- 1) Pastor's Report: Pastor reported making 14 calls, 2 shut-in visits, preformed 2 baptisms, and there will be 1 confirmation on May 11/12. He noted attendance for Lent and Easter services were up this year, and floated the idea of some noon Lenten services.
- 2) President's report: Dennis reported he is still tracking down 1 old insurance policy. LWML will have our grant request on the ballot at June Convention but has lowered the figure from \$2500 to 2000, and has suggested we send in photos of the church as part of a power point presentation (Kelly Hines has put this together-THANKS). He also reported Spectrum has added a \$5/month fee to our 2 business lines and business internet (now \$174.97/month, and AT&T has increased our FAX and primary security lines by \$3/month.
- 3) Vice President's report: Eric reported he has posted council positions & duties for May's Annual Meeting and will seek nominees.
- 4) Treasurer's Report: Russ reported our financial position remains strong.
- 5) Education Report: Erin reported Sunday school& Adult Bible study continues to meet and attendance remains steady at 22.
- 6) Preschool report: Star reported that a District team will visit the Preschool May 20-22 as part of NLSA accreditation, and that enrollment for 2024-25 has begun. Amy is working on details(size, fencing, equipment wanted) for Learning Center.
- 7) Elders' report: Dale presented copy a revised letter for delinquent members that council members approved.
- 8) Stewardship report: Kristi reported 19 shawls were presented to Little Girls' Wishes & Butterfly Kisses and were greatly appreciated.
- 9) Financial Secretary report: Jenn said she post a notice for needed counters in the bulletin as several months need helpers.
- 10) Outreach Report: Ken reported a successful Easter Breakfast and thanked all who helped (nearly 40 attended), candy-filled eggs were provided for Preschool's Easter Egg Hunt on March 21, Open House will be Aug. 17 to coincide with Preschool registration, and a THANK YOU to Star & Kelly for work on improving website and brochures and flyers. Trunk-or-Treat will be Oct. 20.
- 11) Buildings & Grounds report: Craig reported 2 broken windows have been replaced, several light bulbs replaced, several minor toilet issues addressed, mowers inspected and tuned up, replaced battery in Room 3/4 termostat, and ongoing issues at parsonage continue. He received quotes for installation of a backflow preventer and expansion tanks for water supply to church and parsonage. After discussion, Eric made a motion to accept bid from Mr. Plumber to do installation work for \$1147. Ken 2nd. Motion

12) Contribution Secretary Report: Billie reported March's offerings (5 weeks, Lent & aster) were \$19,817 vs. \$15,043.50 in 2023 (4 weeks & Lent), and the number of weekly contributors averaged 32 this year vs. 26 in 2023.

- 1) Alarm System: Dennis and Craig reported fixes to wiring improved issues.
- 2) Pastor reported that District office will meet this month to review By-Law and Constitution changes.
- 3) Safety/Security Team: Dennis and Eric reported progress on survey items. Dennis noted additional fire extinguishers were needed. Team is looking unto providing security kits (flash lights, sashes, walkietalkie), and purchasing security cameras for outside entry areas.
- 4) Business credit card & Amazon business accounts: Star is meeting with PNC & Fifth Third banks about business cards; no updates on Amazon card.

NEW BUSINESS:

- 1) Altar candles: Battery-operated candles have been purchased to replace small altar candles to compare their costs and ease of refilling existing candles.

- 4) Annual Meeting: Sunday, May 19 @ 10:45am. Reports, election of officers, and approving budget.

- Jenn reported OSLS has hired a teacher to fill a vacancy, and is still searching for a principal.
