The Friendship Evangelism Equation



As a summer lover, I'm again in my element. Sorry to any winter lovers out there. You'll have your time. The warm summer weather allows people to gather outside, congregate in places, do things together. I know, I'm taking a risk by titling the lead article of the Disciples'

Connection for 2 summer months in this manner, but I did it anyway [and it does kind of sounds like the title to an episode of "The Big Bang Theory"]. So, I want you to think this for a couple minutes: A math equation ... for friendship. Follow me here. Ample, unhurried <u>time + closeness</u> to a <u>person</u> + an <u>activity</u> [with food is a big plus] = <u>conversation</u>. Multiply <u>conversation</u> by <u>time</u> and the result is <u>FREINDSHIP</u>.

I've long been a believer in Evangelism through Relationships. It involves thinking about the people to whom I am connected and answering 3 questions about them: 1. Who is this person? 2. What is Jesus already doing in their life? 3. How can I join Jesus in what He is already doing? And this is not confined to just the street on which we live. It applies to any place you regularly spend time as well. Think about your own life for a second. When you talk to people, who are they usually? People you already know. With whom do you usually have meaningful conversations? Your friends. How did you become friends? You had ample, unhurried time together, you were in close proximity, and I'll bet there was some activity involved as well. And you didn't just do this once I'm assuming. You did this multiple times. Pretty soon, you had a friend.

We are much more likely to have meaningful, even spiritual, conversations with friends. I'm not saying we don't have them with strangers, because that does happen occasionally. What I am saying is we're more likely to have them with friends than with strangers. God has placed me among these people. Why? That is the \$64,000 question. What is He already doing in the lives of my friends? How have I been prepared to join in what He is doing in their lives?

I think that it's helpful to reflect for a minute. What has God done in my own life? Did He use others? And how did He use them? What am I thankful for today? If we can see God's work in our lives, if we have things we are thankful for each day, you see the reason that God can, and will, use us in the life of someone we know. He used others to draw us close to Himself. He will use you in the same way in the life of someone else. You don't when or how. Just be around, be available. God will bring people into your path. Who are they? What has God done in their life so far? How can you join him? Always remember what a friend you have in Jesus.

Angels and Archangels by Edward Riojas

Artwork and visual symbolism seen in a church building often make a confession long before parishioners hear what is confessed in the liturgy. Some of the symbolic meaning, however, may be lost to us. This is the <u>second of nine articles</u> devoted to those images which we often see — but may not always understand — in the sanctuary.

Everyone loves angels almost as much as they love marshmallow fluff. Angel figurines come out of the woodwork and red storage bins before Christmas and decorate our homes. Some end up topping Christmas trees. Folks dote on well-behaved children and call them "little angels," even though parents are more inclined to have differing opinions of their progeny. Some hear the tinkling of little bells and instantly think of angels' wings. Upon the death of a loved one, many declare that their young ones have "gotten their wings" and that heaven has "received another angel." Not so.

Christ Jesus did not die for angels — He died for us poor, miserable, human sinners. There is no reason for us to aspire to something outside of our Savior's eternal love for us. Neither is there reason to think we become angels or reincarnate as bunnies or hedgehogs when we die. Other religions may believe that, but Scripture does not speak this way.

We have, however, been so inundated with non-biblical imagery of angels that it is no wonder we admire them so much. Somewhere along the line, a bored artist decided to make angels look like someone men might want to ask out on a first date. Striking beauty, rosy cheeks, flowing blonde hair and fiber optic wings have become the accepted ideal, and, unfortunately, it has lulled our stupid brains into a false perception of angels.

Something in my gut tells me the average guy would not want to be visited by an angel of biblical proportions, much less ask one out on a date. Killing machines with six wings, executing the will of the Lord perfectly, and named Raphael or Michael, do not sound like the ideal dates. How did this poor vision of reality take over Christian artwork?

Renaissance excesses

We may thank the Renaissance for this, along with its artists' abuse of artistic license. Renaissance artists sought to return to all things Classical, including Classical Greek and Roman art, architecture and culture. Those who could speak Classical Greek and Latin were considered "cool kids." These Renaissance artists pulled much Greek and Roman art out of context and used it in Christian artwork.

The sculpture, "Nike of Samothrace," a Greek sculpture created during the second century B.C., displays many of these Hellenistic ideals. This sculpture, along with similar pagan figures, likely became a Renaissance model for biblical an-

gels. The Renaissance artists adopted the figure's two wings, flowing robes and feminine characteristics, and we have been stuck with that unlikely vision of angelic beauty ever since.

As if that were not enough, pagan Cupid and his close relatives, the putti, were thrown into the mix and con-

fusingly named "cherubs," upstaging God's <u>thundering cherubim</u> with annoying, fat, chubby children. Some of the most famous putti appear in a detail of Raphael Sanzio's "Sistine Madonna." The Renaissance master painted the piece 1512–1513, and the winged babies can still be found today on schmaltzy coffee mugs, Christmas ornaments and — you guessed it — face masks.

The Northern Renaissance, from which the Lutheran artist <u>Lucas Cranach</u>, hailed, were also influenced by the angels from the "Samothrace" mold. These northern artists were hampered by, strangely, hair styles of the day. The male angels sported long, curly locks instead of a more masculine coif. The central panel of the altarpiece of St. Michael, painted by Gerard David circa 1510, demonstrates this tendency. One must look twice to confirm Michael's gender.

Eastern Orthodox to the rescue

The Eastern Orthodox Church came to the rescue by tempering Renaissance art with odd, though technically correct, depictions of angels — well, at least with one rank of angels. The Eastern Church kept alive the depiction of a sixwinged seraph, who sometimes shows its face, sometimes does not, yet seems to be in perpetual flight. While many examples can be found on Orthodox icons, our example is a fresco found at the Hagia Sophia Grand Mosque (formerly the Church of Hagia Sophia, or Church of the Holy Wisdom) in Istanbul, Turkey.

Scripture does not give full descriptions of angels apart from the seraphim, even though other ranks are named. We should, therefore, probably allow for varied roles and appearances, including those with fewer — or more — wings. Scripture uses masculine angelic names, which is why it is best to reflect that in Christian artwork.

The assumption must also be made that they naturally instill fear. The angel

of death destroyed the firstborn of Egypt; another single angel destroyed the entire camp of 185,000 Assyrians. The Father's

love for us becomes blindingly apparent, therefore, when angels

are sent to frail humanity bearing the Gospel. Even lowly shepherds, working near the birthplace of our Lord, knew enough to fear those who suddenly appear from heaven. So it was that those frightening angels, reflecting the Father's will, first declared, "Fear not."

We often see repeating symbols in Christians churches and artwork. While such things often fall under the umbrella of adiaphora, visuals in the church follow the same formula as church music: They can be edifyingly beautiful when executed with care. They can also, however, be a visual cacophony when carelessly executed or misunderstood. <u>Consider the next few articles in our series</u> a refresher course on traditional symbolism



often seen on Sunday morning. Today we look at the halo or nimbus, as it is alternatively called.

The concept of a halo is not exclusively Christian. A visual ring, or aura, has been used in various ways by other religions throughout history. The aura can surround a person's head or surround their entire body. However, early Christians were always "wise as serpents" when taking elements from neighboring cul-

tures and using them to further the Gospel. Thus, the halo became a useful visual tool when differentiating between depictions of believers and nonbelievers within the context of Christianity. When a crowd was painted, for example, a halo made it easy to identify Christ and each of His believers. This was especially important when considering, as Scripture indicates, that Jesus was otherwise unremarkable in appearance.

For the most part, early Christians placed halos on images of "sainted" Christians, that is, Christians who were

already in heaven and not still walking the earth. Hence, the argument of whether or not any particular Christian — Mary included — deserved to be called holy was a moot point. While Rome had stipulations regarding sainthood, Lutherans left the final judgment in the hands of the Lord and declared, along with Scripture, that all of God's children were holy in His sight.

Later on, it became important to distinguish Christ Jesus from other biblical characters, so the tri-radiant nimbus came into use. The tri-radiant nimbus is reserved for depictions of Persons of the Holy Trinity and has three rays emanating from its center. It is sometimes mislabeled a "cruciform nimbus" under the assumption that there is an unseen fourth ray, but this is a misinterpretation of the symbol. The tri-radiant nimbus is placed behind the head of the dove when depicting the Holy Spirit. It also appears behind depictions of the Father's hand.

Through the centuries, there have been different variations of halos used. Circular, tri-radiant halos are also sometimes re-invented as triangles and placed behind figures of the Holy Trinity, and while other shapes, including squares, have been used for sainted figures. The artistic medium must also be taken into account. It is relatively easy to depict a halo in a painting, for example, but the concept must be rethought when sculpting a halo. A delicate ring will not long survive, so a round plate-like structure is often used instead.

In some corners of Christendom, the halo surrounds an entire figure; this is called an "aureole." Eastern Orthodox icons will often depict full figures of Christ in this way. Roman Catholics also employ the device in some depictions of the Virgin Mary. More specifically — and perhaps most worryingly — artists often use the aureole in depictions of Our Lady of Guadalupe, who is typically shown alone. The Christ Child is nowhere to be seen.

To be sure, there are abuses of halos, but halos give glory to God and attempt to visually set Him apart. Even when placed behind the heads of His apostles and followers, the glory of God is reflected on those who dared to put their trust in the Lord, who lived their lives to His glory, and who often forfeited their lives for the sake of His name.

LWML Ohio District 40th Biennial Convention Highlights



The 40th Biennial Convention of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League was held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on June 22-25, 2023. From the opening sound of the gavel to the closing service, the 3,550+ in attendance "Celebrated the Lord of the Nations". The theme verse was Psalm 33:12-13. "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord, the people whom he has chosen as his heritage! The Lord looks down from heaven; he sees all the children of man."

St. Paul's member, Kelly Hines attended her first national LWML convention as a selected Young Woman Representative for the

LWML Ohio District. She was among 75 YWRs who were inspired by worship opportunities, Bible Studies, speakers, singing and servant events. Billie Lelle, Northeast Zone President, was also in attendance.

The delegates approved a **\$2,350,000.00 mission budget** for the 2023-2025 biennium. 31 Mission Grants will be funded through our mite giving! Elections were held – Eden Keefe from Overland Park, Kansas, was elected to serve as president for 2023-2027.

- The celebration at the Thursday evening worship service which "kicked off" the convention as the Baird Center was filled with joyous music, a powerful message and the celebration of the Lord's Supper. Kelly asked, "Is this what it is like to worship in a mega-church?"

- ✤ The celebration of laughter as we enjoyed the humor of "Laverne and Shirley" (AKA Jan Struck and Abby Goehring). A serious memorable quote from their final interaction: "You don't have to cross the sea to be a missionary, just see the cross".
- ✤ The celebration of song led by the very talented Dina Vandetti.
- ✤ The celebration of seeing our 27 Heart to Heart Sisters of All Nations

- 4) Treasurer's Report: Russ reported our cash position has improved due to an increase in offerings (\$13,308.92) and Preschool Grant transfers over the 1st 11 months, total income up \$20,266 while expenses are down \$5,005.84 for a net gain of \$25,278.84.
- 5) Education Report: Erin reported average weekly attendance for the past couple of months have been steady at 17 and that Sunday school and Adult Bible Study will continue in the summer, and thanked Star for arranging for the flowers for Mother's Day..
- 6) Preschool report: Star reported Preschool will need 2 new assistants, enrollment continues for next year, and touch screens have arrived.
- 7) Elders' Report: Dale reported that members need to remember to fill out Fellowship pads and that covers for pads have been ordered.
- 8) Stewardship Report: Ken reported Val Pak ad started to arrive in the mail on May 31 and council thanked Ken for all his and others' efforts. Ken also thanked Kelly Hines & Billie Lelle for updating our website, and said he will continue most of the work of the Outreach Committee as he takes over that position.
- 9) Financial Secretary Report: Jenn said there are still openings for counters during summer months.
- 10) Outreach Report: Kristi reported Movie night will resume in fall/winter, Trunk-or-Treat will be Oct. 15, Door Tag distribution will again be rescheduled due to rescheduled Spring Clean-up on June 3rd, Helen/ Tim Stegh were presented with baby quilt on May 21 and were surprised and thankful, Neighbor Lunch set for Aug. 5, and she is looking for knitters/crocheters to help make Prayer Shawls. She also said she is sending contact cards to recent visitors.

- 11) Building & Grounds Report: Craig reported making several repairs and bulb replacements, and purchased 4 2.5 gallon gas cans to replace the 5 gallon cans, and has started to map each outlet's source of power and which breaker supplies it. Spring Cleanup is June 3.
- Contribution Secretary Report: Dennis reported that contributions in May was \$22,195 up 15% from last May's \$13,398.50. Without the Preschool Grant turnover, we are down \$6,260.50 (-7.5%). Average number of contributors was 25 up from 23 in 2022.




St. Paul's Preschool Job Opportunity
