# A Matter of Vigilance



<sup>1</sup> First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, <sup>2</sup> for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. <sup>3</sup> This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior. 1 Timothy 2:1-3

This is something that we do on an ongoing basis in the Prayers of the Church during worship. I know many of you are much like me right now. "Boy, do we need to pray for our leaders!" And absolutely those prayers need to continue.

And yet, as I'm writing this article, I find myself in a bit of catch-22, one where there is no good solution. It deals with Issue One, a proposed amendment to the Ohio Constitution. You have no doubt been bombarded by radio, TV, Internet, & mail advertising encouraging you to vote Yes or vote No on this issue. And here's where the problem arises. There are some who believe that we shouldn't be talking about these kinds of things at all, and others who believe we don't talk about them enough. Here is one thing that is black and white. As a called, paid servant of the church, it is not my place to tell you who you should vote for in any public office. On matters of public policy, of which Issue One is, there is some grey area since there is no opposition or endorsement of a particular candidate. I have personally put much prayer and thought into what to say in this forum. I'll be brief and do my best to be informative

I want to first set a small Biblical framework when it comes to life since that is a primary part of Issue One. Psalm 139 is instructive here <sup>13</sup> For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. <sup>14</sup> I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. As Christians, we believe God's Word tells us the Creator of all things and of all people begins life at conception, in the mother's womb.

This is a direct <u>LINK</u> to a Report from the Ohio Secretary of State concerning both Statewide ballot issues. I believe Issue One has more potential impacts to our Christian living than does Issue Two. I believe it is always best to give you the needed information for you to make the best decision.

My prayer for each of you is that you take in the information on these election matters, pray over that information, and let the Spirit guide you in what action to take. Continue to pray for rulers and all who are in high positions. Pray that they would be men and women who actively seek God's will so that we as God's children may live peaceful and quiet lives, godly and dignified in every way

# Thy People's Everlasting Light

We live in a world without night. That is, we live with so many technologies to keep the fall of darkness from hindering our activity and productivity that the transition between daylight and nighttime — at least for us city dwellers (83% of Americans in 2018) — interests us casually, if at all.

No stray beam of sunlight reaches the desk where I work in the inner reaches of a large office building. Nor do I have need of one. The fluorescent lights above me shine changelessly over me and my work. A few times, usually in the week or two after we "fall back" an hour, I have left the office expecting to walk out into evening light, only to find myself exiting into total night, no hint of sunset on the horizon, the sky as black as it will be all night in the St. Louis metro area. A quick glance would reveal a dozen or two stars winking at me from above. I have worked right through the sunset without the least hindrance or notice.

Long before fluorescent lights, flashlights, streetlights or corporate office buildings, Christians gathered to sing praises to our God and theirs — in the morning, in the daytime and often as night fell. At some point in the seventh or eighth century, as they gathered together on evenings during Advent (as we do) to sing praises to the Christ whose second coming they awaited (as we do), they began to sing a chant in Latin, written for Advent Vespers, called *Conditor alme siderum*. We know this text in English as "Creator of the Stars of Night," one of our beloved Advent hymns included in *Lutheran Service Book* (351).

Thou cam'st the Bridegroom of the bride, As drew the world to eventide ...

How different their experience of eventide must have been, over a millennium ago. Our logistical difficulties with an evening church service include things like getting ourselves up off the couch an hour after arriving home from work. We flip a switch to ignite the church's light fixtures and the 8,000 tiny bulbs on the tree in the corner.

As night fell in the seventh century, light for the next 10 or 15 hours meant fire. Lighting the sanctuary meant candles, torches, lanterns. Creating and maintaining light after nightfall involved great effort, not to mention some danger.

And yet, God did not leave our forebears quite to their own devices. As darkness fell, the moon rose, the evening star blinked on and the whole heavenly host followed thereafter. These lights were not as bright as the sun. They did not prevent night from being dark. But compared to total darkness, they were everything.

They were light. And in contrast to the labor of tending fire, these lights from the sky were clearly, wondrously, gifts of God.

Creator of the stars of night, Thy people's everlasting Light: O Christ, Redeemer, save us all, And hear Thy servants when they call.

It seems quite natural that people daily beset by darkness would so readily praise God for His being Light (1 John 1:5). Yet what is meant by "Light" here, and what is this redemption that Christ's people need? The second stanza fills us in:

Thou, grieving that the ancient curse Should doom to death a universe, Hast found the healing, full of grace, To cure and save our ruined race.

The third stanza goes on to tell the story of this cure:

Thou cam'st the Bridegroom of the bride, As drew the world to eventide, The spotless Victim all divine, Proceeding from a virgin shrine.

The hymn moves quite seamlessly from Christ (to whom the whole hymn is addressed) as Creator of light to Christ Himself as the Light of the world. In fact, there really is no "move" at all: The text does not read as if God as Light is merely an image, a way of picturing the redemption of the world, but as if God as Light is literal [1] — not only in the past, back in the manger and on Easter morning, or even today in the forgiveness of our sins only, but also this morning when the sun rises, this evening when the stars and the moon come out. Christ is, literally, the light of the world.

The hymn reminds us, on the other hand, that just as God formed the day and night to be habitable and beautiful to His creatures, so He directs all of history through His providence. The stars reflect God's good will toward us and His creative order in all things, including our salvation. When we read the Old Testament and reflect on salvation history, we can be tempted to wonder: Why did Christ wait so long to come down to earth and save us? And just so we wonder, often during Advent: Why has He taken so long to return? What is He waiting for? This hymn comforts us on these points by reminding us of Christ as Creator. Each night the lights in the heavens appear just when they are needed. Just so was God's timing with the coming of Christ. As the world turned to evening, Christ the star emerged in our sight. "When the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman" (Gal. 4:4). And just so will be Christ's return. It will come at the right time — the right time for us.

What a loving and beautiful reflection on Christ's faithfulness and care for us we gain from our brothers and sisters of centuries ago and the immediacy with which they encountered God's creation. Nightfall made dependence on Christ particularly evident to these early Christians. Pondering this hymn, we may wonder how our own technologically enabled distance from the created world might blind us to the status as dependent creatures which was so palpable to our ancestors in the faith. We have wrought our own "everlasting lights,"

and promptly forgotten about them. As a city dweller, my path is lit for me 24 hours a day, should I choose to venture out, and only in relation to my electric bill do I spare a thought for the origin of this light. Even in secular psychology, <u>studies</u> are again and again suggesting the profound (spoiler: negative) psychological affects that light pollution is having on human beings. It is a strong image, and one that may launch many reflections on our technological advancements, that our fending off of the night has so nearly blotted out our vision of God's created lights.

Perhaps, indeed, this is worth reflecting on — but not for too long. This month's issue of *The Lutheran Witness* discussed anthropology, that is, the study of what it means to be human. If we see ourselves as fundamentally defined by our environment, we may find our sense of self looking rather bleak and isolating. How are we to understand ourselves in a world that has come so far from the days of Christ, from the days of the apostles, from the simpler world that led to the penning of "Creator of the Stars of Night"? How can faith survive in such a blind and blinding world? What do we share with these people who lived in a world so much more visibly God's?

Yet think of this: We still sing this hymn. We may never have been able to write it; we may skip right over the weight of the first line, hearing something akin to "God makes pretty things," and yet for most of the hymn we track right along with our kindred people of a millennium ago.

After singing of Christ as Creator and Redeemer, the hymn sings of Christ Enthroned:

At whose dread name, majestic now, All knees must bend, all hearts must bow; All things celestial Thee shall own, And things terrestrial, Lord alone.

This stanza speaks of a particular era in salvation history, one in which those who wrote the text lived and the very same in which we live. As the stars confess Christ their Creator, so "things terrestrial" — we — confess Him. So Christians of the seventh and eighth century, huddled together by candlelight, sang of Him; so we sing of Him on Wednesday nights in Advent under electric lightbulbs: our King and theirs.

Finally, the hymn moves on to another coming of Christ, the one that they anticipated and that we still anticipate today:

O Thou, whose coming is with dread, To judge the living and the dead, Preserve us from the ancient foe While still we dwell on earth below.

We face the same foe that these Christians did, one far more ancient even than they. With them, we are hopeless against that foe save by the preservation of our God. With them, we await Christ's second coming.



What we are fundamentally is what they were, what we will be as unknown to us as it was to them: "We are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is" (1 John 3:2). What we are and what we will be is in the hands of God, who created us from clay in His image, who redeemed that image in the incarnation and death of His Son, who preserves us now in the ark of His church. We await with the church of all ages the day of Christ's judgement, when together with them we will sing praise to Him in that place where "night will be no more," where "they will need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light" (Rev. 22:5). Only under that everlasting light will mankind be changed, on that day when all that man has wrought over the centuries will fall away as dust, and we will stand as one people before the throne of God.

# **October Meeting Notes**

- 1) Pastor's Report: Pastor reported making 11 calls, 1 shut-in visit, and 1 funeral performed. He and 4 others will attend District Summit Oct. 21 in Hudson. Pastor will attend the Pastors' Conference in Columbus Oct. 8-11. Pastor reported all existing candidates at Synod Convention were reelected with some VP's exchanging positions.
- 2) President's Report: Dennis reported he and Russ met with our Brotherhood Mutual agent to review our policy and see if changes could be made to reduce costs. He also sent out revised changes to Council Standing Rules to council members to review. After attending a Safety & Security meeting, he recommends we purchase "Safe and Secure Church Kit" from Brotherhood Mutual for \$214.
- 3) Vice President's Report: Eric will contact Morley Mowers about this year's snow plowing.
- 4) Treasurer's Report: Russ reported our cash position has dipped a little as contributions are down \$3,806 and expenses are up \$3,508 through the first three months over last year. He said office supplies, insurance, and church/parsonage maintenance expenses were the major increases. The net loss for the months total \$3,714.
- 5) Education Report: Erin reported Rally Day was Sept. 10 to kick off the fall season, with refreshments provided, and that weekly attendance still averages 18.
- Preschool report: Star Reported Preschool enrollment is 33, and the board is working on the NLSA Assessment which is due by Jan. 1 for 2023-24. Also, she said the Popcorn fundraiser runs thru Oct. 17, and that staff and assistants will get T-shirts.
- 7) Elders' Report: Dale reported that Elders will make phone/emails contacts with delinquent members and then letters if needed. They also approved resuming the use of the Common Cup option during Communion beginning October 7.8.
- 8) Stewardship Report: Kristi reported Time & Talent surveys are still being collected and info will be shared with appropriate boards and leaders, and continuing to wrap up items with Outreach Committee.
- 9) Financial Secretary Report: Jenn said she will soon post Counters' schedule for 2024 in November.
- 10) Outreach Report: Ken reported 4 volunteers handed out about 200 Door Tags in Fairway Pines area on Sept. 29, with special thanks to Valerie Sullivan, Kathy Herder, and Kristi McConnell. Trunk-or-Treat will be Oct. 15, hoping for at least 14 cars and 7 volunteers. Ken also was planning to have a ValPak ad ready for the 1st week of December mailing, and said 18 shawls were delivered to Little Girl Wishes charity in August.
- 11) Building & Grounds Report: Craig reported making several light replacements; completed parsonage drain line and seal; and completed installation of locking bolts on classroom doors. He and Dennis re-

placed the sanctuary thermostat. He and Terry striped lines on half of the parking lot (will finish weather permitting), and one of the push lawnmowers is in for repairs.

12) Contribution Secretary Report: Billie reported contributions for September were down \$5,165 from last year (\$15,149 vs. \$20,314) while number of contributors remained at 26.

#### **OLD BUSINESS:**

- 1) Pastor said the online church hymn/liturgy program thru CPH is installed and plugged into a floor jack in the choir loft; cost was \$275/year.
- 2) Insurance review. After meeting with BM agent, Dennis recommended making the following changes to our policy: a) reducing replacement value from 100% to 80% b) raising our deductable from \$1000 to \$2500 c) adding a Preschool rider, which would lower our cost by about \$2300 from its current yearly cost of \$8900.
- 3) Safety & Security Team: Amy will install numbers and letters in classrooms, offices, and kitchen windows to identify rooms for first responders from outdoors, and will make available for review Preschool's emergency manual (including nuclear and railroad accident response). Team will look into installing safety lights in restrooms, handheld radios, smoke alarms in the attic, need for phone and fax access in event of prolonged power outage, and having full fire extinguisher coverage.
- 4) Video camera and Pastor's headset & microphone: Matt Chaffe and Brian Herder are looking into options for these items that fit our needs and budget. It will be compatible with our existing systems. Using U-Tube may be possible to stream content when needed.
- 5) Review of Council Standing Rules: Dennis sent revised CSR as discussed last month, after review a motion was made to accept revisions, was 2nd, motion passed.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

- 1) "Safe & Secure Church" training kit: Dennis recommended purchasing kit from Brotherhood Mutual for \$214 to provide training and suggestions for church safety measures and awareness. A motion was made to purchase kit, was 2nd. Motion passed with 1 dissention.
- 2) Council will look into providing listening devices during services to members with hearing concerns. We already have several but they need to be check out.
- 3) Review of Officers & Board Manual was put on hold due to time constraints and will be brought up in November
- 4) Semi-Annual meeting will be Nov. 19 following 9:30 service.

### **VOTERS' NOTICE**

The following change to our Constitution will be voted on at the Semi-Annual Congregation Meeting. Sunday, Nov. 19, following the 9:30 service. The addition of an article concerning disbursement of the church assets should St. Paul's be dissolved, to read:

#### "Article X: Dissolution

In the event that the congregation dissolves, all property shall be disposed of by the final voters' assembly for the payment of debts and all just claims against the congregation, and any and all surplus connected therewith, shall be donated to the religious or charitable organizations, 501(c)(3)s, including the Ohio District, as determined by the final voters' assembly."

#### **LEAF ANNUAL APPEAL**

Friends and Supporters of Our Shepherd,

As summer has fades into fall, and its again time for LEAF's Annual Appeal. The Lutheran Endowment and Aid Fund (LEAF) was established in 1987 to provide financial assistance to Our Shepherd. In years when the school's revenue doesn't meet its expenses, LEAF helps fill the gap. A board manages and oversees this fund. St. Paul's is represented on the Board by Russ Walton and Terry Wakelee, if you have any questions. Every year since 1987, this fund has produced income and will every year in the future. That is how endowments work.

This year Principal Paul Goodwin, teachers, and staff welcomed 111 students to be *Anchored in Christ* as classes and activities began in August. The enrollment is up nearly 20, but the school will again need to call on funds from LEAF to help meet its expenses. This is why we come to you asking for your support. Our Shepherd is an outreach mission into our community, providing in many cases students' first or only exposure to the Gospel and God's many blessings. Its quality education meets and exceeds state requirements in a safe and caring environment--some local schools do not. Parents in failing schools can choose to send their kids to passing schools, like Our Shepherd. For these reasons, LEAF comes to you for your support, as this is our only source of income. No gift is too small and all are truly appreciated. We ask that you prayerfully consider a gift to LEAF. We thank you for your past support and hope you will keep LEAF and OSLS in your prayers.
